- What is *naturalization*?
 - You are legally an American citizen if:
 - 1. You were born in the United States or its territories.
 - 2. At least one of your parents was a US citizen when you were born.
 - 3. You have been *naturalized* (you have gone through the process of becoming a citizen).
 - 4. You were under 18 when your parents were naturalized.

U.S. Naturalization Process (see chart on p. 57):

<u>Step 1</u>: Applicant submits application to U.S. Citizenship & Immigration Services (USCIS)

Step 2: Examination

- Applicant must meet the following qualifications:
 - 18 years or older
 - Good moral character
 - Legal residence in the country for at least 5 years; in state for at least 3 months
 - Loyalty to principles of Constitution
- Applicant takes Naturalization Test.

Step 3: Final hearing:

- Applicant appears before court.
- Applicant takes oath of loyalty to U.S.
- Receives certificate of U.S. citizenship.
- Naturalized citizens have all the rights of citizens by birth except the right be President or Vice President

What are <u>some</u> of the rights of U.S. citizens?

- The right to vote and to hold elected office.
- The right to say what you think in speech or in writing.
- The right to practice your own religion.
- The right to have a fair trial.

• These rights are based on the fundamental beliefs and values we Americans share:

- Equal respect
- Freedom
- Equality
- Justice
- Service
- The right to life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness

Duties and Responsibilities of a Citizen

Duties of a citizen:

- 1. Obeying the laws
- 2. Defending the nation
- 3. Serving on a jury or as a witness in court
- 4. Paying taxes
- 5. Attending school

• Responsibilities of a citizen:

- 1. Working towards the "Common Good"
- 2. Voting
- 3. Holding Government Office
- 4. Participating in Election Campaigns
- 5. Influencing the Government
- 6. Serving the Community

Duties of a Citizen

1. Obeying the law

- Laws are designed to:
 - Provide a safe place to live
 - · Stop us from hurting each other
 - Make traffic safe
 - Protect our rights
 - Cut down on crime
- The Rule of Law
 - Government of laws: No one is above the law
 - Officials make decisions based on law, not personal bias/opinion
 - Officials are held accountable under the same law
 - Laws are public knowledge
 - Citizens are taught the basic laws of the land

2. Defending the Nation

- Helping our country defend itself is another duty of citizens
- Peacetime/wartime forces are maintained to:
 - Defend our nation
 - Help other nations
- Military Service (Must be 18 yrs old or older)
 - Marine Corps
 - Navy
 - Army
 - Air Force
 - Coast Guard
- The Draft
 - In a national emergency, young men may be called to serve
 - 18 yr old males must register for the draft

3. Serving on a Jury or a witness

Serving on a Jury

- You could be called to serve Jury Duty
- Jury must find person guilty "beyond a reasonable doubt"
- Jury decides whether the accused is innocent or guilty after hearing all the evidence at the trial

Serving as a Witness

 People who have seen events related to the crime or have special information relevant to the case that can prove innocents or guilt for the accused.

4. Paying Taxes

- Taxes pay for services
 - Police, fire & rescue, libraries, road and bridge service, military, education

5. Education

- Attending school: You are being a citizen
 - Society depends on schools to prepare young citizens for the future
 - Schools give students knowledge, skills, and experiences needed to be a responsible citizen

Responsibilities of Citizens

1. Work towards the "Common Good"

- The "Common Good" is the well-being of society
- What does this look like?

2. Voting

- Basic right and important responsibility
- Representatives, President of US, public issues
- Be informed: Read, ask questions, discuss candidates
 - Separate facts from opinion/base decisions on reasons

3. Hold Government Office

• Elected city council members, school board members, mayors, governors, state and national representatives/senators, president

4. Participating in Election Campaigns

- Help a candidate (person running for office)
- Carry a campaign sign
- Stuffing envelopes voter information
- Making phone calls encourage people to vote

5. Influencing Government

- Write letters to representatives, newspapers
- Speak at city council & school board meetings
- Create an organization that influences government

6. Serving the Community

- Make community a better place
 - Pick up trash and contribute to the "common good"
 - Be friendly, respect others even if you disagree
 - Volunteer
