HS.35 Equity Issues & Change Poster

Directions: Using a blank sheet of white paper, design a poster to show one of the groups from the 1960's protesting for their civil rights. Think of your poster as being a snapshot in history or something people may have seen in a newspaper or on T.V. at that time.

Poster Requirements:

- Choose ONE group of protesters from the 1960's: Women, Latino's, Native Americans
- Title at the top (tells the viewer which group's movement you are showing)
- Colorful & Eye-catching (entire page is in color)
- Memorable (viewers can easily relate the picture to HS.35)
- Creative & Unique (do your own work, no tracing)
- Questions (answered correctly, *using complete sentences*, written in paragraph form)

Questions:

- 1. Who are the protesters shown on your poster? What strategies are they using? Are they using violence or non-violent protest?
- 2. Why are they protesting what are their goals? How has this group continued the African American movement toward civil rights for all?
- 3. Who might be in opposition to this group of protesters? How might opponents react to their protest and toward this group?
- 4. How would people around the world react and/or feel if they saw a picture of this in a newspaper? What would people around the world say about Americans after seeing a picture like this?
- 5. Evaluate whether or not this group's protest changed peoples' lives.
- 6. What are some examples of issues that continue to be problem in our society today? Are those problems important enough to protest against/for in order to makes changes today's world.

Grading: 2.0 = Poster meets requirements AND questions 1, 2 and 3 have been answered correctly and in complete sentences..

2.5-3.0 = All of the above AND questions 4, 5, and 6 are also answered. Questions are answered in paragraph form.

3.5-4.0 = All of the above AND the poster is done especially well.

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
